	Apologies were received from Katy Owen, Jason Moorse (NCC); Elizabeth Meath-Baker and Cllr Maxine Webb (NLAF)	
	MS welcomed all and outlined the purpose of the meeting which was (a) to find ways of encouraging greater engagement and involvement of all NLAF members and (b) to establish productive links between the NLAF and lead councillors.	
	It was agreed that the meeting would take the format of a free-flowing discussion around the table.	
2.	Discussion : encouraging greater engagement and involvement of all NLAF members	
2.1	Points made :	
	 NLAF members were very keen to support the Chair and Vice Chair who they recognised put in a huge amount of work to the Forum. This was echoed by NCC officers. 	
	- NCC officers were keen to stress how much the Council valued NLAF members' time and involvement, and there is plenty of scope for NLAF to feed into NCC activities (and put forward points that don't necessarily concur)	
	- NLAF members are appointed through a rigorous recruitment process, and to specific interest areas. However, it was felt that it would be helpful to have a refresher some time after appointment to enable members to better understand how they might contribute from their particular remit.	Refresher on role for NLAF members some time after appointment
	- Some members were nervous about making contributions during meetings, fearing they lacked sufficient expertise to comment, although their time with Forum had enabled them

It was emphasised that all members came with considerable knowledge and experience in their field and NLAF's work would be much the better for having it. - Some members felt it was difficult to disagree with a perceived majority view in meetings – for example, this had arisen during the visit to the Weavers' Way at Honing, where some members thought the track looked better (more natural) before the surface was improved than afterwards - The style of presenting some reports during meetings led to some members feeling that they were being persuaded of something rather than their own views being welcomed in open discussion - Was the NLAF too passive? Not saying clearly enough what it wants to see done to improve access? - Presentations from relevant organisations (such as the Police rural crime unit) were much appreciated by NLAF members as it helped contextualise their role - NLAF has a role as a 'critical friend' of NCC. - NCC is budget-poor with just £14,000 assigned by Natural England to improving the coast path infrastructure for example (although Norfolk Trails Team is separate as is Highways which manage the Countryside Access Officers) - Some NLAF members found the online Norfolk Access Improvement Plan – Norfolk's blueprint for improving

Executive Summary / Introduction from Cabinet Member

Local Nature Recovery Strategies (LNRS) are a new, England-wide system of statutory spatial strategies that will establish priorities and map proposals for specific actions to drive nature's recovery and provide wider environmental benefits. Norfolk County Council has been appointed as responsible authority to produce Norfolk's LNRS and a presentation will be given to the Norfolk Local Access Forum on the timetable and steps involved to enable the Forum to engage with the process where appropriate.

Recommendations:

- 1. To note work underway to produce Norfolk's Local Nature Recovery Strategy.
- 2. We are working in partnership with Suffolk County Council to produce a Local Nature Recovery Strategy for each county.
- 3. Note the timescale to publish the Local Nature Recovery Strategy by Spring 2025.

1. Background and Purpose

1.1 LNRSs are a new, England-wide system of statutory spatial strategies that will establish priorities and map proposals for specific actions to drive nature's recovery and provide wider environmental benefits. The core purpose of LNRSs is to help reverse the decline of nature and biodiversity in England. To

do this, a key feature of the strategies is they will identify areas that are already of importance for nature, along with areas that could become of particular importance and where the recovery or enhancement of biodiversity could make a particular contribution to other environmental benefits. In other words, LNRSs will identify where we should take action for nature's recovery as well as where nature-based solutions can help address wider environmental problems. They will be created collaboratively with stakeholders enabling collective effort to be focussed where it will have the most benefits. LNRS will contribute to the Nature Recovery Network (NRN), a national network of wildlife-rich places enacted by the Environment Act 2021. https://www.legislation.gov.uk/ukpga/2021/30/part/6/crossheading/local-nature-recovery-strategies/enacted. Norfolk County Council (NCC) has been appointed as responsible authority to lead development and delivery of the Norfolk LNRS.

- 1.2 LNRSs are expected to include the wider environmental benefits of nature recovery and will be developed with a broad and diverse stakeholder base with community engagement playing an important part.
- 1.3 Norfolk's Public Rights of Way network often has areas of natural habitat adjacent (to footpaths etc.) which are often the remnants of habitat which previously surrounded them but have disappeared through land use changes (like highway verges). By their very nature, these habitat fragments link up providing opportunities to improve connectivity of habitats for species such as pollinators.
- 1.4 Opportunities to create access to nature to communities through the creation of new access routes, will facilitate greater participation and enjoyment for people to the benefits for nature recovery. Permissive paths may play an important role in connecting communities with their green spaces.
- 1.5 The NLAF has pressed for more information on opportunities to fund permissive access agreements through ELMS and similar schemes as it is an aspiration in the Norfolk Access Improvement Plan (NAIP), Norfolk's Rights of Way Improvement Plan www.norfolk.gov.uk/naip (Statement of Actions 2.7 page 81).

2. Proposal

- 2.1 The Norfolk Local Access Forum is asked to note the presentation and to consider ways in which it can support Norfolk County Council to deliver the LNRS.
- 2.2 We are working in partnership with Suffolk County Council by virtue of shared designated areas of natural environment and landscape such as the Broads,

Breckland and Coast, as well as shared stakeholders, to produce the Local Nature Recovery Strategies by Spring 2025.

3. Impact of the Proposal

- 3.1 The presentation will provide greater understanding of the LNRS process and timetabling for the Norfolk Local Access Forum, a statutory advisory forum providing advice on countryside access improvements.
- 3.2 The LNRS will have a positive impact on the biodiversity of Norfolk.

1	Introductions and apologies for absence All attending (online or in person) were welcomed and thanked for attending. Apologies were received from Ruth Goodall and Birgit Griem from NLAF, and Jason Moorse and Su Waldron (NCC staff).	
2	Minutes of the meeting on 11 September 2023 The minutes were approved.	
3	NLAF meeting on 4 October 2023 The minutes of the NLAF meeting had been circulated and were noted.	
4	Matters arising from the minutes	
4.1	4.1 <u>Norfolk Record Office opening hours</u> : Gary Tuson, County Archivist, had reported that the opening hours had been reviewed and "the pilot of Friday opening was successful, so this will continue from now on. Apart from that, no extension of opening hours is planned for the time being."	
4.2	4.2 East of England Coast Path: It was reported that an initial meeting had been held with Suffolk, Essex and Thurrock Councils and Natural England (NE). This had raised more questions than NE could answer: Helen and Katy were meeting with Andrew Jamieson soon to discuss NCC's involvement. The main output was that more follow up meetings would be needed. Katy congratulated Helen for securing funding for the Coast Path - £50k and £10k from Ramble Worldwide Outdoor Trust (formerly Ramblers Holidays Charitable Trust).	
4.3	4.3 The Great Chalk Way: There was no change to report.	
4.4	4.7 <u>Brancaster boardwalk</u> : The planning application had been approved and the project was now fully funded. Work was in hand, due for completion at the end of March. [Detailed update information is available in two large (9MB) files available on request.]	

4.5 6.2.5 Report statistics: The meeting planned for 28 September had been cancelled and a new date was still being sought.

5 Partnership and Community Working

<u>Issues from represented organisations</u>: Ian Mitchell (The Ramblers) reported on the latest position regarding the DMMOs for Thompson FP1 (a new inspector had been assigned) and the restricted byway at Newton by Castle Acre (outcome expected 2024).

6 Countryside Access Arrangements report

6.1 General update

- 1 An incomplete report had been erroneously circulated before the meeting. A number of guestions was asked about 2.11 in the report.
- 2 It was noted that the retendering of cutting contracts was still in progress and new costs were not yet known.
- 3 David said that it was not possible to give a number of the "[s]everal longstanding obstruction cases [which] remain ongoing".
- 4 A comment was made that the report indicated that reinstatement notices continued to be needed and issued, which seemed to suggest either that the same paths were being repeatedly impacted, or that where landowners changed practice after being advised, new issues were arising (or some combination of both); in either case, it was suggested that the current process of enforcement/compliance was not fully effective. David noted that NCC's approach was to secure support from landowners to get the best outcomes, though it was also noted that when paths were unavailable for extended periods, this prevented people from exercising their rights to use them.
- It was noted that "NCC has recently been rated as No1 (against comparable authorities) in the National Highways and Transportation Survey for customer satisfaction regarding public rights of way." This appeared to represent a significant improvement from previous years, though previously there had been a number of measures relating to public rights of way in the survey; David was asked to provide all the results for this section so that they could be fully understood.
- 6 The completed report is issued with these minutes.

6.2 Specific issues

- 1 Legal challenges regarding longstanding obstruction at Upwell: It was reported that there was no change on this issue, first reported to the subgroup in September 2021.
- 2 King Charles III England Coast Path: It was noted that NCC was still working to establish the Hunstanton to Sutton Bridge section; the funding for establishment had been secured from Natural England (NE) and the new target date was 6 March 2024. NE wanted a low key launch to respect perceived sensitivities from the royal estate. It was in any case hoped that a full launch could be arranged when the Weybourne to Hunstanton section was finally determined.
- Bridleway/restricted byway crossings of major roads: A question was asked if there was a programme of review of all locations where a bridleway or restricted byway crossed a major road. Katy said there was not a list as such, but staff were aware of the crossings and awarded them red/amber/green ratings; decisions on action involved considering whether to prioritise those needing less work to improve them or those that presented larger challenges. In either case, funding and the willingness of Highway Authorities to make changes were major constraints. Helen noted that actions could be taken to alleviate some problems, including seeking signage along the Peddars' Way and discussions with Forestry Commission to explore

- access through its land to connect rights of way to other existing safer crossings. Katy added that there were choices whether to take a Trail by Trail approach or one based on the ratings.
- 4 Adverse impact of private rights on the exercise of public rights: Ken asked if there were there provisions to deal with locations where use of vehicular private rights caused difficulties for those exercising lower public rights (eg by rutting and churning). David replied that there was some recourse when paths were affected during new developments, but historical situations were difficult to manage, where linking damage to private usage was difficult and rights users often expected NCC to remedy damage.

6.3 Major Infrastructure Projects and Planning Applications

- 1 Norwich to Tilbury (formerly known as East Anglia GREEN): It was noted that the Ramblers had made available a list of public rights of way thought to be affected for anyone wishing to research this further.
- 2 Norwich Western Link Project Update: The details presented to the NCC Cabinet were noted. It was agreed to recommend that NLAF waits until the formal planning application is submitted in 2024, when, depending on the date of submission and the timescale for comment, a process for detailed review and preparation of comments could be determined.
- 3 *NSIPs update*: An update from Alice Craske, Project Manager, was gratefully received. It was thought that there were not any issues currently requiring comment by NLAF.

7 Definitive Map Modification Orders

It was **agreed** to ascertain if NCC has a Statement of Priorities for dealing with DMMO applications.

[David has since drawn attention to the content of the NAIP:

The County Council deals with applications for Orders on a first come, first served basis, However, should the need arise in a specific case or due to an increase in applications, especially as the 2026 cut-off deadline draws closer, a system of prioritisation may be introduced.

At present, priority may be given if:

- A route is threatened by developers;
- Processing a case will significantly progress a specific target within the NAIP:
- Where the evidence is based largely on users who may not be available to give that evidence if a long time elapses;
- Where there is an overriding operational need to do so.]

8 Who has a public right of way?

The Executive Summary of this report by the New Economics Foundation for The Ramblers was received, together with a link to the full document. It was noted that the report had been considered briefly by NLAF's Vision and Ideas Subgroup and was to be considered further in 2024, so would not be examined in detail by this subgroup. It did however spark a discussion about the need for, and the steps already in hand to work towards, improving equity of access. Katy confirmed that this was a key part of their work and noted that several of the teams within NCC were (for example) looking at how to target groups that currently did not use Protected Landscapes. She referred to two sources of information - a training resource to start to understand the perspectives of others on outdoor access (and how to help): Welcome | Allyship In The Outdoors (allyship-thenorthface.netlify.app); and a new website, to which it was hoped to welcome the National Trail soon (eventually followed by Norfolk

Executive Summary / Introduction from Cabinet Member

At the July 2017 Local Access Forum (NLAF), it was agreed that at each future meeting, a summary of the work the Countryside Access Officers and Environment teams would be provided. At the October 2017 NLAF it was agreed that this report should be presented to the PROW sub-group prior to being brought to NLAF.

This paper highlights this work in terms of the volumes of customer queries received and responded to. The paper also highlights other key areas of work.

Recommendations:

1. That the Norfolk Local Access Forum notes the progress made to date since the Countryside Access Officer posts were introduced.

1. Background and Purpose

1.1 Since 1 April 2017, there is a single point of contact within each Highways Area office being responsible for their local rights of way issues. By having the officer within the Area office, they are more "on the ground" and better placed to deal with the operational reactive issues that occur when managing rights of way. In addition, the Norfolk Trails team sits within the Environment Service at County Hall and carries out strategic and developmental aspects of developing the countryside access network.

2. Proposal

- 2.1 The information in **Appendix 1** summarises the performance information available for the complete months since the last report.
- 2.2 The CRM defect reporting system went live in March 2018. Defect notes are being made visible to the public in the automatic update emails sent when third party defects have been inspected & more status options available on tablets under the 'No Defect' category, as previously reported.
 - Use of the NCC system is the most efficient way of reporting issues, other systems require additional administration which puts additional strain on limited staff resources.
 - Minor updates continue to be made to CRM to enhance operation and feedback elements.
- 2.3 A new report has been prepared to display the relevant PROW/Trails information via PowerBI Appendix 1 (a) Stats for the last 3 months and Appendix 1 (b) Stats for the last 2 years.
- 2.4 In summary, the Mayrise system of logged requests for service on 1st December 2023 had 1,493 open issues for Public Rights of Way (remaining comparable with the last quarter figures). The fact that overall numbers remain high reflects that PROW issues are often complicated matters to resolve. Most enquiries received continue to be regarding damaged or missing signs, non-reinstatement, obstructions, overgrown surface, overgrown hedges/ trees and surface condition. Vigorous vegetation growth has led to an increase in enquiries about surface maintenance.
- 2.5 The original rise in cases is primarily attributed to the impact of Covid 19. While the country went into lockdown Central Government advice was that local outdoor exercise was promoted for wellbeing and there was evidence of significant increases in walking, running and cycling on village/local path networks across the Country. There were also isolated cases of landowners using Covid as an excuse to close some paths. Naturally, additional use has led to an increase in complaints about the condition of the local path network. There remain considerable backlogs to work through. This has been recognised within the ROW profession nationally and some LAs are now reevaluating the importance of adequately maintaining local path networks and several Eastern Region Highway Authorities have recently reported increases in staff numbers and maintenance budgets in order to manage the demand. Anecdotal evidence suggests that the increased use of local networks continues with people having formed new habits of getting outdoor exercise. There is no shortage of evidence relating to the importance of how local path networks contribute to health and wellbeing.
- 2.6 At the current time there are no additional financial resources earmarked for PROW maintenance. 3 x PROW Technicians have commenced their roles in

- mid-September 2021, one each in support of Countryside Access Officer for the three highway areas in an attempt to tackle some of the backlog of open issues. The contracts have now been extended to March 2025.
- 2.7 Overall, the number of unresolved public enquiries through the CRM system is remaining reasonably steady from the last quarter. As of the 1st December 2023, the Norfolk Trails Team had 188 open CRM issues (up 2) PROW had 152 open CRM issues, (down 6)
- 2.8 These figures do not reflect the substantial volume of reports and correspondence still received through direct email and telephone communication from members of the public, but which remain unrecorded. Neither does it reflect the complexity often found in resolving PROW issues.
- 2.9 In addition to the numbers above, there have been a number of enforcement notices sent out to landowners since April 2023. The figures include more informal email conversations where the landowner is politely reminded that enforcement may follow if action is not forthcoming. The following have been issued:
 - 119 Section 131A,134-137 Non-reinstatement Notices/emails issued. The
 majority are resolved without recourse to further enforcement. It should be
 noted that there are significant resource pressures associated with serving
 and following up on Notices.
 - Since April 2023, 4 Section 130's (obstructions) or s56 (out of repair) notices have been received by NCC.
- 2.10 It should be noted that processing any legal notices is time consuming for NCC staff. Similarly, when NCC receives FOI requests, these are a drain on limited staff resources.
- 2.11 In terms of other progress, key highlights include:
 - Higher incidences of people using local paths during Covid and anecdotal
 evidence that this has continued since. The wet winter 20/21 saw an
 increase in flooding reports and associated bridge damage. These issues
 are still being worked through, Bridges Team have a substantial backlog of
 missing structures, with most of the structures being timber there is a
 constant requirement to replace on a cyclic basis. Approximately 20 larger
 scale structures were replaced on the network each financial year.
 - Smaller scale bridges/ligger crossings remain a Highway Area responsibility and are also subject to continual cyclic replacement.
 - A long-standing flooding issue at Dickleburgh Moor is now resolved through the installation of a culvert but it may remain subject to some seasonal flooding.
 - 2023 cutting: Two cuts were completed on the selected PROW routes in 2023, the final year of the current contract period. Trails routes receive 3 cuts. Retendering will take place in the Autumn of 2023 subject to funding. Significant cost increases are anticipated if the same paths are to be cut from 2024 onwards.

- There have been fewer issues with contractors' quality control this season, but they have been at full stretch, the weather has resulted in vigorous surface growth. It seems to be apparent in recent years (perhaps related to climate change?) that 3 cuts is the minimum required to keep paths open all season.
- Some Parishes have expressed an interest in carrying out their own cutting
 with financial support from NCC (equivalent to the amount spent under the
 main contracts) but to date this only currently applies to a handful of
 parishes.
- Enforcement procedures were carried out on a path at Upwell in 2021 but the path is again obstructed. The matter is now with NPLaw regarding potential court action. December 2023 update: No further progress has been made. Several longstanding obstruction cases remain ongoing. A growing number of encroachment cases are under investigation.
- PROW staff recently attended an "enforcement" course run by the Institute
 of Public Rights of Way (IPROW). As a result, the CAO's will be compiling
 some procedures for PROW to complement NCC's overarching
 enforcement protocols drawn up by Trading Standards and others, to
 ensure a consistent approach across the Council.
- Not all 'enforcement' relies on more formal action. It might be more appropriately be termed as "compliance". Most landowners respond to reinstatement notices and there continues to be dialogue with most landowners leading to small scale improvements that are nevertheless essential to the integrity of the network, e.g. long standing obstructions at Wiggenhall have recently been removed. A landowner has installed a culvert at Clenchwarton allowing the path to be reinstated on the correct alignment. A Parish Charity at Grimston has re-opened a short section of Definitive path with NCC installing a ligger bridge to complete the works.
- The £15k "Urban paths" allocation has a shortlist of sites considered for funding for the next 2 to 3 years assuming this funding stream remains available. Funds are currently allocated for a surface improvement scheme near Methwold High School and a surfacing scheme at Swanton Abbot, both now completed. Prices for the work have risen significantly but the overall budget for such works has remained static. Discussions are ongoing with a Parish Council regarding a scheme in South area for 2024.
- County Councillors have "Member Fund" to allocate to local Highway projects each year, increased to £11k each for 2023/24 and this can be spent on small scale PROW projects of maintenance or improvement. To date, uptake on tackling PROW issues has been limited.
- NCC has recently been rated as No1 (against comparable authorities) in the National Highways and Transportation Survey for customer satisfaction regarding public rights of way.

2.12 Norfolk and National Trails

Since 1st September 2023 the Norfolk and National Trails teams have had:

- 178 issues reported in total (13 issues/week).
- 33 issues inspected and confirmed.

- 61 issues dealt with (or duplications, either way they are 'resolved' on Mayrise).
- 84 currently waiting for inspection.

Issues are aligned with those reported in section 2.4. Updates on work taking place over the last quarter are outlined below.

Recruitment

In January we will be welcoming an Assistant National Trail Officer, to support the small Peddars Way and Norfolk Coast Path National Trail team – initially in the development of Stretch 4 of the Norfolk Coast Path and the delivery of Brancaster boardwalk, as well as the day-to-day monitoring and maintenance of the National Trail. In addition, we have appointed an Assistant Trails Maintenance Officer into the Norfolk Trails team to provide valuable assistance to Martin Caplin in maintaining the promoted Norfolk Trails network. This recruitment represents a significant increase in staffing levels, bringing the number of National Trail officers to four and Norfolk Trail officers to two.

(a) Peddars Way - Broken bridge/ flooding at West Harling

As part of our routine inspections of boardwalks across the National Trail, we found a broken bridge on the Peddars Way. Beyond the boardwalk is significant flooding which happens every year. We have a wet/winter diversion already in place for when flooding although this is quite a lengthy detour from the Peddars Way. Routine inspections of the Norfolk Coast Path boardwalks are due to take place soon.



What have we done? We have closed the bridge and informed the local caravan park as well as the landowners (caravan park), as well as updating the website.

Challenges We are unable to fix the bridge in the current conditions and will require budget to replace the structure in the future.

NAIP theme – THEME 1: Well Managed Access Network

1.2 Manage path surfaces and vegetation: Maintain surfaces in a fit state for public use. Remove obstructions.

(b) Nr. Peddars Way - Stow Bedon, Breckland District, Pingo Car Park





What have we done? We have worked with the Parish Council and local member to push back the vegetation and open up the parking area, to improve user experience, enable more parking spaces and improve visibility. We have created a new entrance which mitigated against cars pulling out on a corner with limited view. The route will be added to the Vegetation Management

Framework to keep on top of future growth. The car park surface has been reprofiled to make it level and prevent excessive puddling.

Challenges: Other priorities prevented this from progressing as swiftly as desired. Finding funds was challenging but this was funded by the local member's discretionary fund.

NAIP theme - THEME 1: Well Managed Access Network

1.2 Manage path surfaces and vegetation: Maintain surfaces in a fit state for public use. Remove obstructions.

(c) Swaffham FP45, footpath extension

What have we done? Section 106 funding (£18,000) has been used to resurface a short section of the footpath that lay outside the land owner by the developer to the start of Swaffham FP45. The resurfacing work connected the footway of Norwich Road to the new estate and the main walked route in the town centre. Public Right of Way signage will be added to each end of the route to complete the works.





NAIP theme – THEME 2: Well Connected Access Network
2.1 - Improve connectivity of the access network through the planning system

(d) Hemsby erosion - Norfolk Coast Path

Following recent erosion at Hemsby, a large proportion of Hemsby FP2 has been lost and is now inaccessible. This footpath formed the National Trail alternative route for when the beach was under high tide. As a result, the Norfolk Coast Path is inaccessible at Hemsby at high tide. The high waters also erode the ramp at Hemsby gap and create a high step which prevents access (see below).



What have we done? A formal closure including barriers and a TTRO (Temporary Traffic Regulation Order) is now in place. We have updated the website and informed local authorities. We are also installing signs on site to notify users of the route that the alternative route is closed and to plan their

route according to the tide times (for which we have given them information sources and access points) to ensure they do not get cut off by the tide.

Challenges This issue now leaves the Norfolk Coast Path cut off at high tide. As there is no possible diversion, are liaising with Natural England to begin discussions on finding a solution. Any possible alternative would need agreement with landowners and for Natural England to process a formal variation report to alter the official line of the alternative route. Natural England are unlikely to be able to submit a report of this nature before March 2024.

Also, whilst the alternative route is a highway in this instance, we receive no additional funding for this being part of the England Coast Path, or any other alternative routes/mitigation measures put in by Natural England.

1.9 Manage Norfolk Trails and the National Trail in Norfolk (Peddars Way and Norfolk Coast Path)

(e) Happisburgh cliff erosion

We are monitoring the cliff erosion at Happisburgh. If the cliff collapses further, this will sever the National Trail.



(f) King Charles III England Coast Path

<u>'Stretch 4' – Hunstanton to Sutton Bridge</u>

The establishment of the KCIII ECP is ongoing. We have quotes for all the works to take place and the grant application has just been approved by Natural England. The necessary consents, some of which have only just been received, combined with other work taking priority had initially delayed the establishment of the route. However, we are working towards an opening date of 6 March 2024.

The first works have taken place already, creating a sloped surface at the Royal Estate in Wolferton.

We are also looking to install creative and engaging interpretation for recreational mitigation at sensitive sites along the route. A designer has been appointed and we will have initial designs soon for the interpretation. We have had confirmation of funding from the Ramblers and the Rural England Prosperity Fund at the end of November for the addition of a sculptural, interpretive art installation to celebrate the completion of the Norfolk Coast Path.

<u>'Stretch 3' – Weybourne to Hunstanton</u>

As part of establishment of the England Coast Path, members of the public and organisations are able to submit objections/ representations to the route if they

disagree with the alignment or have any requests for the route e.g. surfacing requirements.

Once objections and representations are submitted, a planning inspector meets representatives of Norfolk Couty Council, Natural England and any objectors to discuss the issue. Following this they submit a report to the Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs. These meetings took place in October.

We are now waiting for the Secretary of State to rule on each objection which will allow for Stretch 3 to be progressed towards being opened.

2.13 Greenways Team (Green Infrastructure delivery) Sep 2023 – Dec 2023

Brancaster FP5 Boardwalk replacement

Working alongside the AONB team, the National Trail Team and the Specialist Advice Service Team along with NCC appointed contractors to deliver significant access improvements along Brancaster Footpath 5. This project will enable more people of all ages and abilities to enjoy the wildlife and scenery of the Norfolk Coast Path and Norfolk Coast AONB by providing a new 1.7km boardwalk that will provide inclusive access to this very popular part of the coast for local communities and visitors, whilst protecting the fragile saltmarsh environment.

Planning permission approved 27 September 2023 (Borough Council King's Lynn and West Norfolk Planning Reference 23/01326/FM).

Works started 23 October on construction of the new boardwalk. Expecting first half of new boardwalk to be installed along the eastern section by Christmas 2023 (862m). Remaining 838m along western section to be installed between January and March 2024 along with passing places, viewing platforms, bump strips and seating.

New aggregate (Carrstone) path will be laid at east and west end of the boardwalk to create stable level access onto and off the boardwalk. This has been programmed to start and completed in March 2024. The boardwalk will remain closed until construction on both the boardwalk and aggregate path have been completed it is made safe for public use. Completion of works estimated for end of March 2024, weather permitting.


This project is supported via a range of funding sources (total value £1.3m). NCC Capital Maintenance Fund (CMF) has been used as seed corn to draw down significant funding from BCKLWN CIL, FiPL, AONB access funding and Natural England capital underspend.




^{2.14} Wherryman's Way CIL

(a) Hardley Flood

The Wherryman's Way at Hardley Flood is currently closed to the public due to broken bridges and unstable, uneven banks.

Nofolk County Council have secured CIL funding to complete phase 1 works along Hardley Flood (from Chedgrave Common to the bird hide - see image below). This year has concentrated on a number of ecological surveys of the site (to inform design) and feasibility study of the 4 bridges on site.



There are a number of protected species which will require licences to carry out works as a well as mitigation measures to be implemented as part of the construction methodolgy. We are working in partnership with the Broads Authority who have already provided dredged material from the River Chet to build up the banks. This has been left to dry out during 2023 and reprofiling works to reshape and reinstate the public right of way has been programmed for May 2024.

Norfolk County Council will be submitting a Planning Application for phase 1 works December 2023. Work includes repairs and reinforcement to two bridges to prevent either bridge collapse or slips, trips and falls. The addition of new/improved ramp access in order to apply the principles of least restrictive access will make it easier for more residents and tourists to use the bridges.

This programme of work has been devised to start the reopening of these footpaths with minimal disturbance of protected species in phase 1, which will give access to the view of Hardley Flood and the Parish Council owned bird hide.

Bridge works will be programmed to run alongside the Broads Authority reprofiling. We expect all phase 1 works to be completed by July-August 2024.

There is an ambition to fully reopen access along Hardley Flood Public Rights of Way (PRoW) with phase 2, however this is subject to additional funding and taking advice and guidance on the complex ecology needs situated between the other two bridges on the Hardley Flood site. These two bridges require a full replacement as the current structures are not safe.

(b) Bramerton FP5

Nofolk County Council have secured CIL funding to complete riverbanks stabilisation works along Bramerton FP5. We are working in partnership with the Broads Authority to deliver this project. The Broads Authority have procured a contractor for design and build gabion and rockroll to re-einforce the river banks and provide dredged material to build up the public right of way.



Norfolk County Council will be submitting a planning application to the Broads Authority in December 2023.

We expect all works to be completed by July-August 2024.

2.15 Access for All CIL

(a) Marriott's Way Costessey Lane

Project is in design. CIL funding secured for resurfacing 170metres and widening to 3metres of existing path from the A-Frame bridge to Costessey Lane, and installation of new steps and handrails. The works will improve current surface conditions and drainage as well as improved safety features including sight clearance for better visibility for all users (pedestrians, cyclists and horse riders)

(b) Saxlingham Nethergate BR6

This public right of way forms part of the Boudicca Way long distance trail from Norwich to Diss. The bridle way frequently floods is impassable after heavy rainfall. This scheme will deliver drainage improvements and resurfacing along 130 metres to allow the route to be accessible all year round.

3. Clarification of Timescales re issue reporting

- 3.1 The NLAF requested clarification of the issue reporting process which is presented below:
- 3.2 If an issue is reported online this will be allocated to the tablet of the responsible Countryside Access Officer/ Trail Officer for review almost straight away. If there is a danger to life, we advise customers to call in and our colleagues in the customer service centre would alert the local team so that they can take remedial action within 2 hours. If a report is made by fixmystreet or by email, there will be a delay as these have to be manually added to the system (usually one working day)
- 3.3 Officers will assign a priority to each defect reported based upon a risk assessment. Our Countryside Access Officers will prioritise enquiries as per the TAMP):
 - 9.1.1.1.7. Public Rights of Way
 - 9.1.1.1.7.1. Work programmes are based on a risk assessment of the severity of the problem and the likelihood of its affecting others. Issue logged for attention as follows:
 - High if it affects a nationally, or regionally, promoted route
 - Medium if it affects a well-connected or well used path
 - Low if it affects only an isolated generally unused path or one that runs alongside another path. Those deemed a low priority will be actioned when resources are available.

The risk register helps officers determine the priority. The timescales of which are below.

- (i) If the defect is not deemed an emergency and is on a trail, it is allocated to a Trails Officer to investigate, prioritise and action based upon the resources available.
- (ii) If an issue has already been reported, this should be visible on the online map so the customer knows that this has already been identified. The customer who reported the issue will get an email update after investigation to advise if this is a duplicate (where we have identified the issue already and it is in the system); if we are sending out a letter to landowners; or if we have identified work is required. If it has been identified that work is needed and a customer has not had a response in

over 6 weeks, our customer service colleague will look to see the status of the defect and assign to the relevant officer to provide an update.


