Chairman's opening remarks in tribute to His Royal Highness The Duke of Edinburgh who had died on 9th April 2021.

At the start of the proceedings the Chairman paid tribute to His Royal Highness The Duke of Edinburgh who had died on 9th April 2021. The Chairman said that Prince Philip would always be remembered with a special feeling of affection arising from his long and happy periods of residence at Sandringham with The Queen and other members of the Royal Family. The Duke served our country with great distinction throughout his life and graced many events in Norfolk with his presence over the years.

The Chairman said that he had written to Her Majesty The Queen expressing County Council's sincere condolences.

Councillors and officers joined in a minute's quiet reflection on the life of His Royal Highness The Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh, at the end of which the County Chaplain Revd Liviu Barbu offered prayers.

1 Minutes

1.1 The minutes of the Council meeting held on 22 February 2021 were confirmed as an accurate record of the meeting.

2 Chairman's Announcements

2.1 The Chairman said that on Friday 16 April 2021 he had attended an evening song service at Norwich Cathedral on behalf of the County Council that was dedicated to the memory and life of His Royal Highness The Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh.

3 **Declarations of Interest**

- 3.1 Cllr Alison Thomas declared an other interest as she had been personally affected by the flooding that had taken place across the county in December 2020.
- 3.2 Cllr Thomas Smith declared an other interest as he was appointed by the County Council to the Governing Body for the Queen Elizabeth hospital in King's Lynn.
- 3.3 Cllr Chenery of Horsbrugh declared an other Interest as a Trustee of NORAH (Norfolk Archives & Heritage Development Foundation).
- 4 To receive any items of business which the Chairman decides should be considered as a matter of urgency.

4.1 There were no items of urgent business.

5 Questions to Leader of the Council

5.1 Question from Cllr Dan Roper

Cllr Roper stated that despite the Conservative 2017 election manifesto promise to keep Council Tax increases as low as possible, Council Tax in Norfolk had risen by 18% in the last 4 years and much of this increase was due to Government cuts and reductions in funding. He asked if this meant that the Conservative Party was now the Party of Council Tax and if returned to be the Administration after the elections how much the Leader anticipated Council Tax would rise in the next 4 years.

The Leader replied that everyone recognised that in the last year, as in preceding years, difficult decisions arising from the level of local government funding were continuing to have to be made, however, net spending had risen significantly in Norfolk to deliver the services that people valued the most and a large part of the Council Tax increase of the last year was aimed specifically at the need to keep adult social care services going.

5.2 Question from Cllr Sandra Squire

Cllr Squire asked if following the forthcoming elections a new Council would be an opportunity for the Council to have a fresh start, to listen to the residents of Norfolk rather than just say that it did and to put the people and the environment at the heart of future Council decisions.

The Leader replied that the Council already listened to what people had to say and placed an emphasis on the environment and environmental policies and supported all the people of Norfolk.

5.3 Question from Cllr Karen Vincent

Cllr Vincent asked if the Leader would join her in praising all Council staff for the work that they had done over this past most challenging year and give some reassurances that the Conservative Administration would continue to support residents as the pandemic continued.

The Leader replied that over the last 12 months a lot of effort had gone into continuing the Council's operations during the pandemic and in achieving the high standards that everyone now came to expect from the County Council The Leader gave examples of how the County Council had provided the leading role in the public health response to Covid-19 (including outbreak control and local test and track), maintained key services for vulnerable adults and children, expanded digital services and maintained the roads. The Leader added that the Council had worked with the District Councils and the voluntary sector to shield the community from the worst effects of Covid-19 and to provide food supplies and new Council improvement schemes such as the third Great Yarmouth river crossing. The Leader said that he planned to retain the Council's positive achievements of the last year that had led to stronger community spirit and investment in strengthening care and

community resilience and more economic development that would ensure a better future for all the people of Norfolk.

5.4 Question from Cllr Alexandra Kemp

Cllr Kemp stated that the County Council had fought a campaign to keep the Fire and Rescue Service under its control. Cllr Kemp asked if the Leader would inform the Government that they were wrong to now be looking to force the transfer of the Fire and Rescue Service away from accountable elected Councillors.

The Leader said that a few years ago the County Council had reached the conclusion that there was no merit in the transfer of functions provided by the Fire and Rescue Service to the Police and Crime Commissioner. Opinion across the Council on this matter had not changed. The Police and Crime Commissioner already had a huge role and was unable to provide a better Fire and Rescue Service. Where Fire and Rescue Services were retained by Councils across the country they were under direct elected control. Norfolk had an excellent case for saying to the Government that the current arrangements did not need to be changed therefore why change it.

5.5 Question from Cllr David Harrison

Cllr Harrison asked if the Leader believed that the £500 self-isolation payment was an incentive to spread Covid-19.

The Leader said that he did not.

5.6 Question from Cllr Mick Castle

Cllr Castle asked if the Leader agreed with him that the continuing uncertainty about Government intentions for devolution was making long term strategic planning difficult for Norfolk and, if so, would he be making his views known to the Prime Minister.

The Leader said that he and others recognised the value that devolution could bring to this county and to other areas of the country. The uncertainty was in how devolution would work in practice; whether it required local government reorganisation first and the devolved powers and finance that went with it. The Leader said that he had made a strong case for devolution of powers and for ensuring that Norfolk got the maximum benefit it possibly could from devolution.

5.7 Question from Cllr Carl Smith

Cllr Carl Smith asked if the Leader could give examples of how the County Council could work better with its partners.

The Leader said that it was essential for local service partners to work better together. Over the last 12 months numerous new multi-partner partnerships were created such as the Norfolk Strategic Flood Alliance; regular meetings were held with Norfolk MPs, the Public Sector Leaders Board and improved arrangements were put in place for working with the NHS, amongst others.

5.8 Question from Cllr Tim East

Cllr East said that after 38 years as a local councillor for Costessey he did not want people with disabilities to be in a worse position now than when he started as a Councillor in 1997. The High Court had called the Council's MIG cuts irrational. Because many disabled people remained to be paid back in full or in part, did this mean that the Administration was cruel and callous.

The Leader said that he wished to congratulate Cllr East on his 38 years of service in public life. The Administration was not in any way cruel or callous. All the work that needed to be done to sort out the finances of those effected by the High Court judgement was being done carefully and this matter would be resolved as soon as possible.

5.9 Question from Cllr Sandra Squire

Cllr Squire asked a question on behalf of Cllr Maxfield who had indicated that he would be late attending the meeting. Cllr Squire stated that the Chair of Trimingham Parish Council awaited a reply from the Leader about the sale of County Council owned land in the parish. Cllr Squire asked if the Leader would commit to a review of the County Council's asset disposal policy so that it met the needs of the local community first as the most important consideration.

The Leader said that the sale of land at Trimingham was ongoing. The Council's asset sales policy aimed to make sure that the best sale value was obtained but equally recognised that there were times when it was important to place emphasis on community value. The asset disposal policy would be kept under review.

6 Recommendations from Committees

Cllr Morphew said that while he supported the recommendations, going forward the Council should give further consideration to how all councillors could become more engaged with the decision-making process, the member information protocols, the corporate board structure and the role of political groups in the decision-making process.

Cllr Roper said that the Council should consider its capacity to undertake scrutiny work.

7 Cabinet Report (Questions to Cabinet Members)

Cllr Andrew Proctor, Leader and Chair of Cabinet, moved the report of the meetings held on 7 December 2020, 12 January 2021, 1 February 2021 and 8 March 2021 and the report of the meeting held on 12 April 2021 included with the supplementary agenda.

Council **RESOLVED** to **AGREE** the reports.

7.1 Question from Cllr Brian Watkins to Cllr Greg Peck, Cabinet Member for Commercial Services & Asset Management.

Cllr Watkins asked how when reflecting on how nice new refurbished facilities, including the car park might be at County Hall the Cabinet Member viewed the cuts to the minimum income guarantee, cuts to the funding of Childrens Centres and Holt Hall, the introduction of DIY household waste charges and cuts to the music service.

Cllr Greg Peck said that he had not been reflecting on how nice County Hall would be after refurbishment. All the approved expenditure on County hall was for spending on health and safety and access issues. The car park was to facilitate the use of the building and there was already interest from other public sector bodies should there be excess capacity.

7.2 Question from Cllr Mick Castle to Cllr Borrett, Cabinet Member for Adult

Social Care, Public Health and Prevention

Cllr Castle asked if he agreed that the continuing delay in the Government's long heralded future plans for adult social care had become a major embarrassment and if he would impress on Government that they needed to tackle this issue as a priority in the aftermath of the pandemic.

Cllr Borrett said that he was personally disappointed that the County Council had not yet received a fuller response on the issue of the future of adult social care. He recognised that the Government had been presented with other very pressing issues over the last 12 months and said he would continue to press for Government time to be found to sort this issue out because it was one of the most pressing pieces of unfinished business and had a direct effect on a large number of Norfolk residents.

7.3 Question from Cllr Alison Thomas to Cllr Jamieson, Cabinet Member for Finance

Cllr Thomas asked the Cabinet Member if he agreed with her that good financial management and decision making had put Norfolk in a strong position not only to face ongoing challenges with the pandemic but to support vulnerable people and be a good position not only to move forward but to respond to unexpected emergencies such as for example the flooding experienced across Norfolk last December.

Cllr Jamieson said that the main focus of the Administration would continue to be on ensuring the protection of vulnerable people, ensuring that children continued to have the best possible start in life and that Norfolk developed strong infrastructure that supported and add value to the local economy. In order to achieve this the Administration would continue to deliver balanced budgets that brought Norfolk's business transformation and smarter working programmes together at the heart of everything that the County Council did. The Council would continue to utilise national government assistance to deliver on its priorities and build a better future for Norfolk.

The Cabinet Member explained the specific reserves that had been set up by the County Council to respond quickly to further foreseeable pandemic related pressures that might emerge during the ensuing year. The Cabinet Member also explained the steps that were being taken to address the floods that took place in Norfolk in the winter and spring of this year. The Cabinet Member added that as Norfolk moved beyond the pandemic one of the main benefits of prudent financial management was that the Council would be able to pivot towards greater economic growth, greater protection of Norfolk's countryside as well as retaining and improving Norfolk's highly valued community services, libraries, museums and recycling centres. The Cabinet Member said that delivering on a growing and thriving economy for the County was the best way to support and improve the quality of life of Norfolk's residents so support for the delivery of the economic recovery into the future .

7.4 Question from Cllr Kemp to Cllr Martin Wilby, Cabinet Member for Highways, Infrastructure and Transport

Cllr Kemp stated that West Norfolk had a high carbon footprint and everything must

be done to encourage active travel and yet the Cabinet Member had personally signed an order to open Hardings Way to traffic even though he knew how strongly the local community were against this. Cllr Kemp asked if the Cabinet Member accepted that he was wrong and would commit to keep Hardings Way a bus and cycle lane as it was originally intended.

Cllr Wilby said that he did not accept that he had reached the wrong decision.

7.5 Question from Cllr Dan Roper to Cllr Graham Plant, Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Growing the Economy.

Cllr Roper asked how confident people should be at Norfolk bouncing back effectively and economically if this Administration was returned given that during the last four years Norfolk's economic record at creating new jobs had fallen year on year and the level of wages had remained well below regional and national averages.

Cllr Plant said that the County Council was working hard with its partners to make sure that Norfolk got the maximum funding that it could from new government funds for economic growth. He explained the detailed funding that was being sought from the community renewal fund and other sources of government funding and the work to put in place a recovery plan after the pandemic that made sure Norfolk was well placed to help business plan for the future.

7.6 Question from Cllr Squire to Cllr Martin Wilby, Cabinet Member for Highways, Infrastructure and Transport

Cllr Squire asked if the Cabinet Member agreed that it was time for a review of the Council's policy on speed limits and road safety measures in the County. She said that Cllr Maxfield had written to the Leader last month and had yet to receive a response. The current policy put in place in 2014 was too restrictive and did not take into account changing patterns of road use. Traffic surveys had shown that speed limits should be reduced on safety grounds, however, it was up to Parishes and local member funds to find the money to make the road safe.

Cllr Wilby said that he was fully aware of the concerns about speed limits and this was something that would be addressed after the election.

7.7 Question from Cllr Richard Price to Cllr Graham Plant, Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Growing the Economy.

Cllr Richard Price stated that the Government had recently published guidance for the Levelling Up Fund that enabled counties to bid for funding for transport hubs. He asked what the County Council approach was to its own bid and to that of providing support at the district level.

Cllr Plant said that in March 2021 the Government launched two key strategies designed to help kick start economic growth after the pandemic and level up those areas in need of additional support. These funds were complementary to each other and the Council was marshalling its own resources as well as those of the Local Enterprise Partnership and District Council partners to help potential applicants to apply for funding. The Shared Prosperity Fund was a successor to the EU funding that had benefited Norfolk over the years. The Cabinet Member

said that these funds would be worth £1.5 billion a year from 2022. While all areas could bid for funds the government had identified 100 priority places for the funding, four of which were in Norfolk (Great Yarmouth, King's Lynn Norwich and North Norfolk). The whole of Norfolk was considered a priority place for countywide programmes such as skills and employment and business support. A shortlist of bids had to be submitted to the Government by 18 June 2021 and the outcomes should be known by the end of July 2021.

Cllr Plant added that the Levelling Up Fund was a £4 billion fund which ran until 2024/25. The first round of bids closed on 18 June 2021 and only included projects that were ready to start in this financial year. There would be several further bidding rounds until 2024 and the County Council was working with Norfolk MPs and partners to pull together a strong set of bids for the Autumn. Priorities would be small transport schemes, regeneration and town centre improvements and cultural assets with a focus on net zero emissions. Scheme should include cycle provision, public transport, enhancements to road networks and bridge repairs. The County Council could submit one transport bid over the lifetime of the fund and was examining the best package bid in collaboration with District Councils. The Government had published a priority list of areas most in need, including Great Yarmouth and King's Lynn in category 1, with other areas of the county in category 2, except Broadland which was in category 3.

7.8 Question from Cllr Tim Adams to Cllr Graham Plant, Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Growing the Economy.

Cllr Adams said that the national picture on apprenticeship starts had shown a rise in starts in 2018-2019 after three years of falling numbers and yet Norfolk's numbers had continued to decline. He asked why it was that other Local Authorities had achieved success and yet Norfolk could not.

Cllr Plant said that he accepted that the Norfolk success rate on apprenticeships was not as good as it should be. This was not, however, entirely due to Norfolk County Council. Businesses were being encouraged to take on apprentices through the kick start scheme and other schemes that were in place. The Cabinet Member accepted that numbers had gone down in recent years but that this was part of a national drop in numbers that would change in Norfolk with the new schemes that were put in place. In a year's time there would be a completely different picture.

7.9 Question from Cllr Barry Stone to Cllr Margaret Dewsbury, Cabinet Member for Communities and Partnerships

Cllr Stone asked the Cabinet Member to outline the role that libraries had played during the past 12 months.

Cllr Dewsbury said that the Service had continued to support local communities following library closures on 21 March 2021. Staff had continued to provide books and magazines online and to support literacy projects such as the Norfolk reading pathway. Staff had also supported those digitally excluded to gain new digital skills and helped parents to educate children at home through the use of electronic devices. To encourage young people to go back into libraries overdue charges were being removed for the under sixteens. Furthermore, staff had supposed a programme of work to assist vulnerable people through food distribution across the

county. Services to local businesses had also been maintained.

7.10 Question from Cllr David Harrison to Cllr Borrett, Cabinet Member for Adult Social Care, Public Health and Prevention

7.10 Cllr Harrison asked Cllr Borrett what he considered to be his biggest mistake during the current Administration.

Cllr Borrett said that he would have liked to have had notice of that question, however, he was very proud to have had a wide range of different roles within the Council that had enabled him to drive forward the policies of the Administration.

7.11 Question from Cllr John Ward to Cllr Greg Peck, Cabinet Member for Commercial Services & Asset Management.

Cllr Ward asked the Cabinet Member for an update on the role of Repton Homes and the affordable homes scheme.

Cllr Peck said that Repton was established in 2017 with the primary objective to undertake direct property development with the aim of maximising the financial returns for the Council in order to support service delivery. Repton Homes were delivering mixed communities of not just private housing but also shared ownership and social housing. The Cabinet Member gave an example of where work was expected to start on site later in 2021 to build 48 new affordable homes to be completed and handed over by guarter one in 2023.

7.12 Question from Cllr Ed Colman to Cllr Martin Wilby, Cabinet Member for Highways, Infrastructure and Transport

Cllr Colman asked if Cllr Wilby would like to join him in congratulating the County Council on a successful bid for £700,000 of funding to provide a new bus service in the Swaffham area. He also asked for an update on the County Council's bus strategy.

Cllr Wilby said that he was very pleased that the Council was awarded the £700,000 loan for community transport which would support around 20 villages in the Swaffham area. (This second question was not answered due to connectivity issues. It was noted that Cllr Colman could take the matter up directly with the Cabinet Member after the meeting and request a written response if he required one).

7.13 Question from Cllr Fran Whymark to Cllr Borrett, Cabinet Member for Adult Social Care, Public Health and Prevention.

Cllr Whymark asked what plans the Cabinet Member had to support the care sector and especially care homes during the pandemic.

Cllr Borrett said that care homes and the care sector as a whole had faced a set of unprecedented challenges in the last 12 months and Norfolk care homes had shown very strong leadership in coping with those challenges. The County Council had done everything it could to help care homes staff to manage the pandemic. £22 million was allocated to provide support with infection control and a further £3 million for testing and just over £2 million to help with workforce issues. Also, a

further £6.4 million had recently been allocated to continue to support infection control and testing which would continue until June 2021. Norfolk could be proud of the daily contact that had been maintained with care homes and the high uptake in the vaccination rate of both care home staff and care home residents. The increase in Council's fee levels for the year ahead should support Care Homes and pay for salary increases above the national living wage. The Council's focus was on improving the image of care work and on trying to attract new people through a major recruitment campaign. The Council recognised that some care providers faced a period of instability. The Council would continue to work with providers at risk using discretional financial support where appropriate and help to do all that it could to shape the future of the industry.

This Council recognises that a successful 2021 Summer Holiday Season will be critical if Norfolk is to avoid large-scale business closures and redundancies. The Cabinet – using earmarked balances - is urged to take a lead in bringing together the County's Tourist Boards, City and District Councils and Norfolk Attractions and Hospitality Businesses to promote Norfolk's holiday offer in a high profile coordinated campaign running through from May to September - including the County's outstanding Museums and drawing on the positive engagement of the Norfolk Media to enhance this mission to attract major spending in Norfolk this Summer.

Following debate and upon being put to the vote the motion was **LOST**, there being 5 votes in favour, 45 votes against and 21 abstentions.

The following motion was then proposed by Cllr Steve Morphew and seconded by Cllr Terry Jermy:

Council believes it is now time to end part time night lighting and turn back on street lights for those areas that have the lights switched off in the small hours. Recent disturbing events and reports from women who feel unsafe on our streets shows we must do whatever we can to reduce feelings of fear and opportunities

for malicious acts. This is one positive step Council can take now. Council recognises that since the introduction of part night lighting a decade ago many lights have been converted to LEDs that reduce the costs and emissions from leaving lights on through the night.

Council calls upon the Leader to use delegated powers to restore full night lighting in areas where it has been restricted and to reprioritise the LED replacement programme to ensure there is LED lighting where the lights will be switched back on.

The Chairman asked for it to be included in the minutes that there were sufficient Councillors present in the meeting who had indicated that they were in favour of a recorded vote being taken on the motion.

Following debate and upon being put to a recorded vote (Appendix A), with 22 votes in favour, 46 votes against and 2 abstentions, the motion was LOST.

10.3 The following motion was proposed by Cllr Brenda Jones and seconded by Cllr David Collis:

Council recognises that the QE hospital in Kings Lynn is no longer fit for purpose and must be rebuilt urgently.

Council welcomes the campaign being run by the Eastern Daily Press to highlight the urgent need for a decision.

Council urges the Secretary of State for Health to urgently approve a new build hospital for Kings Lynn to replace the Queen Elizabeth and to fast track its build and design.

The following amendment was proposed by Cllr Borrett:

Council recognises that the QE hospital building and its infrastructure in Kings Lynn has major structural issues is no longer fit for purpose and must be rebuilt urgently.

Council welcomes the campaigns being run by the Eastern Daily Press and the one being run by the Local MP James Wild to highlight the urgent need for a decision.

Council congratulates the Secretary of State for Health and the Government for the money for the rebuilding of the James Paget Hospital in Great Yarmouth which suffers from the same structural problems.

In the same way as this funding was provided Council urges the Secretary of State for Health to urgently approve a new build hospital for Kings Lynn to replace the Queen Elizabeth and to fast track its build and design.

Before this amendment was seconded the mover of the original motion withdrew the motion with the consent of the seconder.


The Chairman ended what was this final meeting of the current County Council by thanking all Councillors for the hard work that they had put into their respective

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Procedure for Leader's Question Time

In order to give as many people as possible the opportunity to put a question to the Leader, questions should be asked succinctly and in a business-like manner. They should not be preceded by lengthy preambles. Similarly, answers should be given succinctly, to make sure there is sufficient time for a reasonable number of questions to be dealt with. The Chair will be prepared to intervene if he considers this principle is not being adhered to.

Agenda Item 5 - Questions to the Leader of the Council

Questions to the Leader will be a 15-minute session for questions relating only to the role of Leader.

- 1. Questions to the Leader must be relevant to matters for which the Council has powers or duties. Members do not need to give prior notice of what they plan to ask and the Chair's ruling as to relevance of questions will be final. If the Leader cannot give an immediate answer or feels that a written answer would be more helpful or appropriate, then the questioner will receive a written reply and this will be published to all members and to the public via the minutes. The Leader may ask Cabinet Members to answer questions where appropriate.
- 2. The Chair will begin Leader's Question Time by inviting the Leader of the Labour Group to ask the first question. All Group Leaders may delegate the asking of their question to another member of their Group. There is no right to ask a supplementary question.
- 3. After the first question has been answered, the Chair will invite the Leader of the Liberal Democrat Group to ask a question.
- 4. When the second question has been answered the Chair will invite the Leader of the Green Group to ask a question.
- 5. When the third question has been answered, the Chair will invite and select a member of the Independent Group to ask a question.
- 6. When the fourth question has been answered, the Chair will invite a Member of the Conservative Group to ask a question.
- 7. When the fifth question has been answered, the Chair will invite Cllr Alexandra Kemp (Non-aligned Member) to ask a question.
- 8. If the 15 minutes has not expired, the Chair will then invite questions from Group Members in the following order:

Labour Group Liberal Democrat Group Green Group Independent Group **Conservative Group**

9. The session will be timed by Democratic Services officers. If a question is being asked at the point time is up, the Chair will allow the question to be completed and the answer to be given.

Report of the Audit Committee Meeting held on 22 April 2021

- 1 Work in Support of the Norfolk response to the Covid-19 pandemic.
- 1.1 The Chairman placed on record the Committee's thanks to the Norfolk Fire and Rescue Service (NFRS) and Council staff for their work in supporting the Norfolk response to the Covid-19 pandemic.
- 1.2 The Committee noted that as part of the response:
 - 14 NCC colleagues had provided support to hospitals, 3 colleagues had supported vaccination call centres, 2 qualified nurses had supported the vaccinations and 187 hours were provided to GP centres.
 - NFRS staff had also provided a huge range of valuable support, including ambulance driving, delivery of essential items to vulnerable persons, delivering PPE and other medical supplies to NHS and care facilities.
 - In the first lockdown a total of 982 shifts for East of England Ambulance Service NHS Trust (EEAST) were provided, a total of 13,215 hours of work through the April to July 2020 period.
 - In the Jan to April lockdown, a total of 89 staff had volunteered for NFRS NHS bank support. Staff had also provided 430 shifts and 5160 hours assistance with "face fit and swabbing" and 198 Shifts and 2376 Hours assistance with vaccination support.
- 2 Presentation on the work carried out by IMT on cyber security, anti-phishing, disaster recovery, etc.
- 2.1 The Committee received a presentation (which could be found on the Committee pages website) from Geoff Connell, Head of IMT, that provided an update on the work IMT had completed on cyber security and disaster recovery; phishing exercise, etc.
- At short notice during the pandemic a very successful campaign called "Every Child Online" was launched with the support of Norfolk schools, the EDP, charities and other partners, including private sector suppliers. As part of that campaign, IMT staff managed to provide laptops and help with connectivity issues approximately 5,500 digitally disadvantaged children and assisted hundreds of Norfolk's schools to tackle a very wide range of IT issues.
- 2.3 The Committee RESOLVED to place on record thanks to Geoff Connell, Head of IMT, for the presentation on cyber security and disaster recovery; phishing exercise, etc. and for the work as part of the Every Child Online campaign.
- 3 Norfolk County Council's Insurance Cover

- 3.1 The Committee received a report by the Executive Director of Finance and Commercial Services which provided the Committee with assurance as to how the insurance provision was delivered for the County Council and how claims against the Council were managed by the Insurance Team.
- 3.2 The Committee RESOLVED to agree that proper insurance provision existed where appropriate, as confirmed by external and internal reviews and accept the report.
- 4 Norfolk Audit Services Report for the Quarter ended 31 March 2021
- 4.1 The Committee received a report by the Executive Director of Finance and Commercial Services which supported the remit of the Audit Committee in providing proactive leadership and direction on audit governance and risk management issues. The report updated the Committee on the progress with the delivery of the internal audit work and advised on the overall opinion on the effectiveness of risk management and internal control. The report also set out work to support the opinion and any matters of note.
- 4.2 The Chairman asked for the report to the next meeting to include a brief update on the position regarding each of the deferred audits.
- 4.3 The Committee RESOLVED to agree the key messages featured in the quarterly report, that the work and assurance meet their requirements and advise if further information is required.

5 External Audits

- The Committee received a report by the Executive Director of Finance and Commercial Services which introduced the External Auditor's Annual Audit Letter NCC and NPF and Certificate 2019-20, which were attached as appendices to the report. The report also introduced the External Auditor's Provisional Audit Plans for the Council and Norfolk Pension Fund 21-22, which were attached as appendices; and confirmed that the PSAA had published the 2021/22 audit fee scale, following consultation in January and February 2021.
- The Committee noted that the pandemic had not resulted in a significant change in existing risk assessments. The approach to risk assessments had remained consistent throughout the pandemic. However, there was an additional risk associated with the accounting arrangements for government grants. This was because there had been a significant increase in the number of individual grants and a quantum increase in the value of these grants in money terms. The accounting arrangements for individual grants was not yet clear which meant that they posed an increased level of risk.

- 1.1 The Committee received the report setting out an application for the expansion of the existing 1200 pupil secondary school to a 1500 pupil school by construction of a new stand-alone three storey building, and refurbishment works to the existing school, improved secure fencing to the front of the school, an increase of 42 car parking spaces and 60 cycle storage spaces and relocation of the existing on-site temporary modular accommodation at the Ormiston Victory Academy, Middleton Crescent, Costessey.
- 1.2 The Committee unanimously **RESOLVED** to **APPROVE** that the Executive Director of Community and Environmental Services be authorised to:

Introduction and background

The Localism Act 2011 specifies that every Council must appoint, through a proper recruitment process, at least one independent person. Independent persons play a key role in the Council's procedures for investigating complaints relating to ethical standards and their views are sought and considered before a decision is made on whether a Member has breached the County Council's Code of Conduct.

In January 2021 the Standards Committee noted that the period of office of the previous Independent Persons was due to end and with their consent it was agreed to extend their appointment until the end of April 2021 to allow for a recruitment process to take place. On 26th and 27th April 2021 a Member Panel met, supported by the Director of Governance and Monitoring Officer, to interview for the recruitment of two new appointees for the 4-year period. The Panel unanimously agreed to recommend two candidates to the roles (Christine MacDonald and Tracy Colman) and now asks Council to approve these appointments.

Recommendations

That Council approves the recommendation from the Standards Committee Member interview Panel to appoint Christine MacDonald and Tracy Colman to be the County Council's Independent Persons.

1. Background and Purpose

- 1.1. The Localism Act 2011 outlined the importance of retaining a proper degree of independence within the system for dealing with complaints relating to ethical standards. This was intended to ensure transparency, and provide assurance that complaints are dealt with effectively and at a distance from the political arena. For this reason, every Council must appoint, through a proper recruitment process, at least one Independent Person. In March 2016 the Standards Committee agreed that the appointment of one single person had given rise to difficulties at certain times and agreed to appoint two persons to ensure resilience in covering the duties of the role.
- 1.2. The Localism Act sets out very specific criteria for who can undertake the role. A person is not independent for these purposes if they are a "member, co-opted member or officer of

the authority" (or relevant parish council) or a relative or close friend of such person. Furthermore, an independent person may not be appointed "if at any time during the 5 years ending with the appointment" the person was a member, co-opted member or officer of the authority (or relevant parish council).

- 1.3. Independent persons need to be trusted, experienced and objective advisors from diverse backgrounds. They provide their services to the council on a voluntary basis and they:
 - Do not have voting powers
 - Are not officers, Councillors or Standards Committee members
 - Are not co-opted onto the council
 - Their views must be taken into account by Standards Committee in any case where an investigation has been commissioned and the committee has to make a decision

The views of the Independent Persons may be considered by the Director of Governance and Monitoring Officer at various stages during any informal processes. They may also give their opinions to a Councillor who has had a complaint made about them and who seeks advice. It is important to note that this role will not extend to advocacy. An independent person will remain objective, therefore, in the advice that he/she gives to members, the monitoring officer and Standards Committee.

2. Proposals

2.1. On 26th and 27th April 2021 a Member Panel met (consisting of Councillors Corlett, Kiddle Morris and White), supported by the Director of Governance and Monitoring Officer, to interview for the recruitment of two new appointees for the 4-year period. A number of applications were received from which a shortlist of seven suitable applicants was agreed. Following the interviews, the Panel unanimously agreed to recommend to Council that two candidates be appointed as Independent Persons. The Panel's recommended candidates are Christine MacDonald and Tracy Colman. Brief resumes of the recommended candidates are attached at Appendix A.

3. Impact of the proposal and reasons for decision

- 3.1. Appointing two Independent Persons will ensure that the County Council complies with the Localism Act 2011. It will also ensure that we have robust measures in place for dealing with complaints relating to ethical standards and transparency in our processes.
- 3.2. In appointing two people to the role the County Council will have access to more than one independent perspective and will provide continuity and resilience should one person not be available or need to stand down before the end of the term of their appointment.

Rebuilding the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, King's Lynn

West Norfolk cares passionately about its hospital. The nurses, doctors and support staff at the QEH worked tirelessly throughout the pandemic at great personal cost, in this 41 year-old hospital, built to last 30 years, with a roof constructed of defective concrete, which started to cave in this December. With the roof now being held up by 194 steel props across the hospital, the QE desperately needs a full and imaginative rebuild fit to serve the public in the twenty-first century. Unfortunately, the Govt has left the QE off the list to rebuild forty hospitals, but will rebuild hospitals that are not falling apart. This Council appreciates that the QE cares for patients in Norfolk, South Cambs and South Lincolnshire and is a focus for people with complex health needs and frailty in a retirement area, this Council also recognises its role and responsibility to drive up health services and outcomes within the new Integrated Care System, supports the effort of the management at the QE to secure funding and resolves to write to the Govt to ask it to fund the QE for an immediate rebuild.

2 Proposer: Cllr Jamie Osborn Seconder: Cllr Ben Price

- i) This Council recognises the dangerous and accelerating effects of climate change and ecological destruction for Norfolk.
- ii) Council resolves to declare a Climate Emergency as other councils and the UK Parliament have done.
- iii) Council recognises that climate change in Norfolk is inextricably tied with social and economic inequalities which mean that climate change will disproportionately affect certain groups.
- iv) Council recognises the evidence from scientists that, in order to meet legally-binding climate change targets, Norfolk must reduce its CO2 emissions by a minimum of 13.5% year on year.
- v) Council resolves to ask Cabinet to adopt a carbon budget tool to allow Norfolk to track its emissions profile to 2030 and facilitate the adoption of measures by the council, the council's partners, Government, and the public to help meet evidence-based carbon-reduction targets.

Council recognises that the QE hospital building and its infrastructure in Kings Lynn has major structural issues and must be rebuilt urgently.

Council welcomes the campaigns being run by the Eastern Daily Press and the one being run by the Local MP James Wild to highlight the urgent need for a decision.

Council congratulates the Secretary of State for Health and the Government for the money for the rebuilding of the James Paget Hospital in Great Yarmouth, which suffers from the same structural problems.

In the same way as this funding was provided Council urges the Secretary of State for Health to urgently approve a new build hospital for Kings Lynn to replace the Queen Elizabeth and to fast track its build and design.
